The history of the Goethe Society during the Nazi period is unravelled by Professor Daniel Wilson.



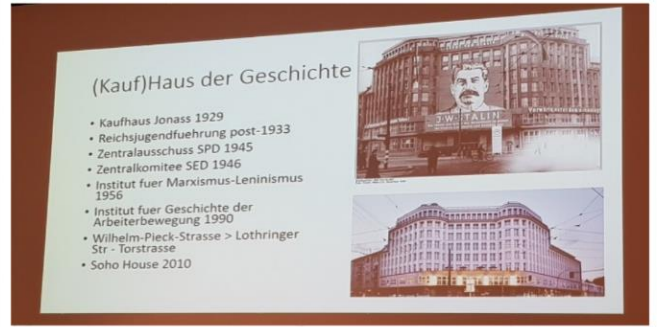
Prof. Helen Gilbert on the communication of climate change impact through indigenous performances.
